More and more fires are happening at recycling, trash transfer and landfill facilities. This is due to LITHIUM-ION BATTERIES.


When lithium-ion batteries are punctured or damaged, they can quickly catch fire as the cells are exposed to air. This reaction happens because the materials inside the battery are highly flammable and can ignite when they come into contact with oxygen.

These batteries must be treated as hazardous waste and NOT put in your trash or recycling bins.
